May 21 Cosy Sheridan

Cosy Sheridan has been called “one of the era's finest and most thoughtful singer/songwriters.” She has played everywhere from Carnegie Hall to the Philadelphia Folk Festival and is the winner of numerous songwriting awards. Her music has appeared in best-selling author Robert Fulghum's book *Third Wish*, as well as on *The Dr. Demento Show* and NPR's *Car Talk*. In her critically acclaimed new CD *Eros* (WindRiver), Sheridan weaves a cycle of songs about love.

Cosy Sheridan first appeared on the national folk scene in 1992 when she won the songwriting contests at both the Kerrville Folk Festival and the Telluride Bluegrass Festival and released her critically acclaimed CD *Quietly Led* on Waterbug Records. *Folk Music Quarterly* wrote: “When she's accepting her Grammy, we can say we knew her when.”
